

We are sad to pass on the news that Maurice Healy, who was FQW's first elected Chair and did so much to establish the Friends, died in November. He was a lifelong consumer activist with a distinguished career including Editor of 'Which' magazine and then Director of the National Consumer Council. He retired early in 1991 but went on to chair a number of internationally significant committees concerned with consumer affairs. We remember him as a charismatic Chair of the Friends for eight years, someone who loved the wood and always took part in working parties, when he loved dead hedging or clearing ditches with vigour.
